- We have had a busy month harvesting and replanting with fewer members to assist due to vacations and other commitments. We had 18 members present at our last meeting. We had 2 members leave the group.
- We have harvested the garlic. We are drying and selling it, little by little. We are saving 2 of our largest bulbs for next year.
- One Wednesday morning I noticed that 2 of the kale plants had been cut off close to their roots, which is different from the way we harvest kale. I knew immediately that someone had stolen the plants. We checked the rest of the vegetables and found that 6 ready-to-harvest beets, carrots and other vegetables were also missing. Shelly searched the video and saw that a couple of people visited the garden at 10:00 pm and returned at 11:00 pm with shopping bags to harvest the produce. At our request, Robyn has made up a laminated sign for us in the hope that this will deter thieves.
- We also have some small new thieves devastating the garden, especially the tender new lettuce.
 We have not seen these birds before, but they look like sparrows, with light coloured stripes on the outside of their eyes. We have watched the mother birds teach their babies to pull the new lettuce leaves apart and eat them. They hop under sticks and through nets and seem quite happy around us. We do not mind sharing but wish the would give the baby lettuce a chance to grow.
- We seem to have controlled the slugs with eggsells.
- We are now harvesting zucchinis, pattypan squash, Lebanese cucumbers, a few tomatoes, along with green and purple beans and garlic.
