Activity Group Reports and Highlights—December 2022

<u>EVENTS PLANNING COMMITTEE (EPC) – 2022 SUMMARY REPORT</u> - Submitted by Anne Ladouceur for the CHA Events Planning Committee

The Events Planning Committee was established at the 2022 CHA AGM and over the past year has organised a number of regular and special events through a number of sub-committees and support groups. The Fir/Douglas Rooms have been reserved on Wednesdays for on-going and special evening events.

ON-GOING (MONTHLY) EVENTS:

Monthly Birthdays: These have been held monthly on the last Wednesday of the month (sometimes doubled because Centre closed on the last Wednesday) with one-hour live entertainment and dancing. We began the year with 31 attendees at the Jan/Feb party and ended the year with 90 at the December party (held on 4 January 23). With references from a number of local organisations, including the Royal Canadian Legion, we have expanded the list of potential entertainers and will be trying out more of them in 2023.

Monthly Movies: In the Spring, the Events Planning Committee put together a Movies sub-committee who decided to begin offering movies one Saturday a month, which is when space was available, starting in September. Attendance has grown from 5 to 12 attendees over 4 months. Members are encouraged to suggest movies they would like to see, and the committee members will do their best to accommodate.

SPECIAL EVENTS:

International Women's Day: A small sub-committee organised 'Just Desserts' to celebrate International Women's Day in March. Guest speakers shared their personal stories, around the theme "Break the Bias" through comedy, poetry and personal stories with 23 participants. This was the first time that CH celebrated International Women's Day and the committee was very impressed with the turnout given that many of our members were still hesitant about gathering and that, because CH was just opening up after COVID, this event was put together in less than a month.

Comedy Cabaret: This event was originally scheduled for the Spring, but Murphy's Law intervened and we rescheduled it for September. Five different comics had the over 40 people attending enjoying a good laugh.

Diwali: The EPC in collaboration with a number of CH's South Asian members began planning for this event in August. The sub-committee decided to offer an evening event along with two workshops to introduce CH members to the history of the Indian Festival of Lights as well to South Asian culture and dance. The workshops were free events while 53 tickets were sold for the evening event on 19 October. The Tuesday 18 workshop was capped at 30 attendees due to space restrictions. More than 50 people attended the Saturday 22 October event.

Sock Hop: The November 16 Sock Hop featured performances by tribute artists Roy Orbison and Patsy Cline. While 50's-60's fashion was optional, many of the 90+ attendees came dressed in pink jackets, poodle skirts, saddle shoes, quiffs and ducktails

ACTIVITY GROUP SUPPORT:

CH Seniors Gay Straight Alliance Hoedown: The EPC supported the organisation of the annual Hoedown that returned this past August. Over 70 people attended the free of charge Tuesday afternoon (9 August) event

UPCOMING SPECIAL EVENTS:

Lunar New Year Events (January): The EPC brought together a group of CH's Asian members (China, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Korea and Vietnam) to organise a Lunar New Year Celebration at Century House. The group decided on two events — one on the evening of 18 January consisting of a light meal featuring 2 samples of each Vietnamese, Korean and Chinese cuisine plus entertainment and the other, a heritage dumpling making demonstration again focused on dumplings from the 3 countries listed above. Participants have the option of participating at Century House or from home via Zoom on Friday 20 January.

Murder Mystery Dinner (February) to be held on Wednesday 15 February

International Women's Day –to be held the evening of Wednesday 8 March.

Planned Spring Special Events (dates to be confirmed soon): Karaoke/Dance events, Diamonds & Denim, afternoon Tribute Artist musical event, among others.

SUPPORT WORKING TEAMS: The EPC includes work teams of volunteers that support the monthly and special events. These include the serving team, the set-up and reception team, laundry, decorating and promotion. Individual volunteers have taken on the responsibility of decorating, promotions and helping CH staff with serving at some of the special events.

THANK YOU TO VOLUNTEERS: One of the goals of the CHA Events Planning Committee was not only to offer a variety of different types of events to our members but also to bring together a wide variety of volunteers to work together, including some for whom this is a new experience, people who have never worked together before along with old hands.

PEER SUPPORT REPORT TO CENTURY HOUSE AGM for the year 2022

Peer Support is the new name for what was, formerly called Senior Peer Counsellors. The request for the name change came in February 2022 and Prospero Credit Union was finally able to record the name change on our account in November 2022. Peer Support is "Donation" driven, so, donations are now payable to Century House Association, Peer Support.

We trained 12 new volunteers in January/February 2022 and updated those who had been trained in 2019. We have five male counsellors. Peer Support provides continuing Professional Development on two Wednesdays a month. July and August are "self-care" months.

Over the past year we provided services to male and female clients. As well, there has been an increase in services provided to seniors who are over 90.

We are entirely "donation" driven and donations in 2020. 2021, and 2022, have been low, compared to previous years. Our paid coordinator/counsellor is being paid from past donations and is not paid by any government agency, municipal, provincial, or federal. Our project for 2023 is planning a "fund" raiser and delivering a nine-session program called "Aging in Place". Aging is place will be held on Thursday afternoons in February, March and April of 2023.

For your information, all our financials are recorded in the CHA treasurer's 2022 report handed out for the AGM.
